We found that 93% of our active duty beneficiaries got their treatment needs meet in primary care behavioral health with only 7% being referred to specialty mental health care. Nellis AFB is only 1 of 4 Air Force Bases to have an intensive outpatient program. Nellis AFB saved over \$2M in costs for civilian IOP services in just the first year of operation. Additionally, Airmen are being returned to duty at a much quicker rate than when they were in civilian IOP programs. Led an amazing team that won many awards at the Squadron, Group, Wing, MAJCOM, and Air Force levels.
- Program Manager to help develop and prepare the 99th Medical Group to become a level III trauma center. Worked with community partners to complete all requirements to ensure all regulatory items are met, transfer of patients to other facilities, enrollment in Medicare/Medicaid, and to provide quality patient care.
